Dear Friends,

February brings us into the season of Lent, which lasts for forty days, not including Sundays. It begins on Ash Wednesday, February 22nd, and ends on Holy Saturday. The forty days represent Jesus's time wandering in the wilderness. During that time, he was tempted by Satan, but mostly, it was a time to prepare him for ministry.

In church life, Lent is a time of repentance, fasting, and preparation for the coming Easter. Many people focus on what they may give up during Lent, for example, fasting. We forget that during the fast we should have a period of self-examination. The fast should bring a person closer to God. Historically, Lent was a time for new converts to fast and prepare for their baptism, but over the years it became a time of penance for all Christians. Presently, we are encouraged to grow in our relationship with God, devote time to studies, and volunteer, or donate our time to others. In other words, the focus seems to be on discipleship.

I remember fasting when I was younger, but it wasn't until I was an adult that I learned that Sundays were not included in the forty days. Sundays during Lent are considered "mini-Easters." For most people, the fast continues even through Sundays, but the knowledge and celebration of the resurrection should be in our hearts throughout the year. May this year's Lenten experience allow you to experience and share the love of Christ with a world that is very much in need of it.

Scott tells a story about when a story about when his church group visited Russia and he met a ten-year-old Russian orphan named Sasha who, for some reason, latched on to him. Sasha took Scott by the arm and led him through the orphanage, showing off his room and the place he ate meals. All the while Sasha's eyes were filled with joy and laughter. In spite of the fact that Scott spoke little Russian, and Sasha spoke no English, they connected. As the church group prepared to depart, Sasha sat beside Scott, pulled a silver ring from his finger, and held it out for Scott to take. His eyes filled with tears and Scott spoke the only Russian word I knew — "Nyet, nyet." (No, no.) This child, who had nothing in the world to call his own except this ring, desperately wanted to give this ring to him. When asked why Sasha wanted to give his only possession away, Sasha responded through an interpreter, "Because I am so thankful Scott came." For Sasha, abundant joy, extreme poverty, and a heart filled with gratitude overflowed in a wealth of generosity. For many of us who have so much, we want more. We are not thankful for what we have and always look for the "something more." And truth be told, it's never enough. What would happen if, by God's grace, our desire to gain more and have more could be transformed by gratitude into a heartfelt desire to give more? What would happen if in a spirit of gratitude, we spent as much time figuring out ways to give as we spend figuring out how to earn, have, and keep? Can you recall a time when you were truly thankful despite negative circumstances? Can you recall a time when someone who could least afford it gave you a generous gift? What was it like? How did you respond?

These children get healthy breakfasts, lunches, and snacks at school, but the school counselors are concerned about those kids over the weekend. This program sends healthy snacks home with these children on Friday afternoons, to help supplement the families' meals.

Finance Update

Our budget for 2022 ended on a positive note. While we were slightly over our budgeted amount, this was due to paying two bills that are paid quarterly and will take care of expenses in that category for January and February. While we budgeted \$100,000 from our general endowment, we only had to bring \$77,000 into the budget. We were slightly over our budgeted amounts in certain line items, but came in under budget for both salaries and general expenses. We were \$5000 below our pledged amount in revenues, but had nearly \$46,000 in unpledged revenues. The number of donations was down slightly over last year, but the average donation was slightly higher than last year. A ministry budget report is available in the Narthex, if you would like to review this information in more detail.

With this said, we still have substantial work to do for the 2023 budget. Our stewardship drive has not successfully obtained the amount of pledges we were hoping for during the upcoming year. We are \$50,000 lower in pledges than last year, which is very problematic. If you have not completed your pledge card, please do so now. Also, we have lost several contributing members of our congregation during the past year, so that will also lower the amount of contributions. Our goal for the past two years has been to lower the amount of money we are using from our general endowment to pay for budget expenses. While we have been successful in lowering this amount, we still need to be able to lower it by another \$25,000-30,000 in the upcoming year.

As with everyone, our investments took a major hit in 2022. We are hoping for a better 2023 for investment earnings. We will continue to work on ways to raise money for the church through grants and other fund-raising mechanisms, but the largest portion of our funding does need to come from contributing members. Please consider increasing your financial giving to the church, if possible, either through an increase in your weekly giving or a one time contribution during the year. If you would like to talk with someone about a financial plan for giving to the church, please contact the church office and we can have a financial person contact you to let you know your options.

As we enter 2023, we are entering the last year of our capital campaign. We are on track to meet the pledges for this campaign and want to thank all of you for your generosity is contributing to the campaign. We have completed the majority of the campaign projects. The two main categories remaining are new computers for the staff and the new membership campaign for the church. If you have pledged money for the campaign, please continue to pay this money so we can finish the projects and continue to pay back to the loan.

We look forward to moving forward in 2023 through a variety of outreach activities and ministry plans. We can only successfully do this through our members and your contributions in time, talent, resources, and commitment. All the best to each of you for a wonderful 2023!
