Dear Friends,

I was thinking about the 23 Psalms today while working on this letter. It is currently a fantastic spring day. The sun is shining, and the grass is the shade of green that only comes in early spring. Trees are forming new leaves and leaving pollen dust on all the vehicles. Driving down the road, I see many tiny calves kicking up their heels and running with abandon. "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want."



Turning into the church parking lot, I see that the grass has recently been mowed. It looks so soft that I can imagine lying in it and watching the clouds as I hear the melody of the robins nearby. "He maketh me lie down in green pastures." I walk into the church; it is quiet and peaceful. I recently spent a week on a mission trip, and returning to our church sanctuary's calmness brings me peace. "He restoreth my soul."

I feel such peace while I read the words of the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm. It reminds me to look and listen for God in unexpected places. We must be thankful for the beauty surrounding us and the Word of God in scripture. A Psalm like this one encapsulates the love of God so thoroughly that I feel reassured of our Savior's presence when I read it.

I feel blessed for the Psalmists, who opened their hearts to God and spilled it out in writing, allowing us to be confident that we can share anything with God. The Psalm reminds us that God is, that God restores, that God leads, that God is with us, that God will anoint us, and that we shall dwell with the Lord forever.

Our world is not at peace, yet I can rely on passages in the Bible to bring me peace. As I let my mind wander about the love of Jesus, I will leave you with this verse from Philippians and pray that you will feel the peace of Christ: "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things."

May will mark the 8<sup>th</sup> anniversary of PUMC Ruby's Pantry. We distributed 59 shares on our opening distribution in 2016 and now we distribute over 400! #### Honoring the Past, Planning for the Future

Our church is very blessed that we have had a wide range of donations over the years to help us become financially stable. We want to continue that trend by ensuring that we have sufficient funds to maintain our house of worship and complete our mission work.

We appreciate all the donations for our three year capital campaign of "Raise the Roof", which ended in December 2023. We were able to take care of a long list of deferred maintenance items for our church, most notably the roof. As we continue to be good stewards of our building, we have

identified a number of additional items that need to be completed. Our new mini campaign, "Honoring the Past, Planning for the Future", will begin on April 1<sup>st</sup> and last for 1 year. Our goal is to

raise \$100,000 during this time frame to fund the following items:

- New boiler (anticipate needing to replace this in 2025)
- Solar panels
- Handicap accessible bathroom
- Refurbishing the stained glass window tributes
- Prayer labyrinth
- Upgraded audio and video in the sanctuary
- General building maintenance

As our building continues to age, we need to ensure that we have sufficient funds in our endowment accounts to continue to replace, fix, and upgrade our current building and supporting equipment. Therefore, any money that remains after completing our list above will be put in the general building maintenance fund to take care of future needs in the building.

# **Finance Update**



Our budget for the first quarter of the year has brought in revenue of nearly \$79,000 and expenses of nearly \$89,000, so we currently have a \$10,000 deficit in the budget. We are at or below all our expense categories for this time of year, but only at 19% of our tithes and offerings for this time of year (should be at 25%). We will be bringing in some scheduled endowment earnings during the second quarter, but we still need to increase our weekly giving of tithes and offerings to keep our budget balanced. If people would like

to see the breakdown of budget revenues and expenses, there is a report in the narthex of the church by the window to the office.

Our endowments have done very well during the first quarter. We have a return on investment of 5.2% during this time frame. We know that April has not been a good month in the stock market, hopefully that will improve as the year progresses.

Our fund-raising efforts for the year (including grants) have brought in over \$15,000 to date. The mini capital campaign has just begun and has brought in over \$5,000. An update on the amount that has been pledged for the capital campaign will be in the June article of the newsletter. Your pledge card is included for the mini capital campaign (Honoring the Past, Planning for the Future), please return it as soon as possible.



#### **Family Promise**

Have you ever wondered what the Family Promise Program is all about? FP is a program that lifts homeless families and helps them succeed. There are guidelines for participating in the program. A family consists of a couple or at least one parent with children. They must pass the background check and choose to abide by some rules. If they want to participate, churches in the county can host the families in their building or support churches by providing volunteer assistance. During the day, they return to the Day Center in Lancaster, where they receive counseling and guidance for resume writing, job searching, seeking housing, or whatever their needs are to become a successful, independent, and housed family unit.

Why do I feel this is important, or why am I involved? I, Susan, have seen success with churches helping the homeless. I saw my parents get involved in starting a program for people experiencing homelessness in California. It grew, and a transitional home started. Men moved out of the program and could go back to their families and be supportive family members again. One man went through the program, graduated from the Wesley House, and landed a job as the maintenance man of the senior apartment my parents later lived in. This is what Dad wanted for these people, and he was able to experience the success of one man returning to his family. Although his program wasn't FP, it took people off the street and helped get them back to where they wanted to be.

I believe in FP and its mission to get families back on their feet. We should have more people volunteering, as it takes many hands to show the love of Jesus Christ to those in need. Online training is provided so you know what to expect and how to interact with the families appropriately. If you haven't been in the shoes of people experiencing homelessness, it may be hard to understand what they are going through. We, as volunteers, like the participants, have guidelines to follow. Please listen to the voice of God. Is He calling you to serve His people in this way? In the last few months, we have had a couple of new volunteers who have heard God's call. Our next rotation is June 2-9th. The signup sheet is on the office window ledge, or call the church office at 608-348-9508. 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# **Ingathering at Annual Conference 2024**

WI Conference Mission Motivation Committee will again be collecting items for Midwest Mission at Annual Conference. We are focusing on Personal Dignity Kits and Home Care Kits but appreciate any items found at <u>midwestmission.org/kits</u>. All items should be NEW – and all kits should have only the items requested. Thanks!

Midwest Distribution Center distributes the kits locally, nationally, and internationally to those in need during times of crisis. All supplies are given free of charge regardless of gender, race, or religion. Midwest Mission is one of eight cooperating depots in the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) Supply Network. Midwest Mission distributes UMCOR supplies in response to disasters within the United States.

Donations should be brought to Annual Conference at the KI Center in Green Bay. They can be dropped off at the Midwest Mission truck which will be located on Elm Street behind the KI Convention Center.

Volunteers will be on hand to load supplies: Friday, June 7<sup>th</sup>, 10am – 4pm & Saturday, June 8<sup>th</sup>, 8am – 4pm.

If you are <u>not</u> able to make it to Green Bay this year you can bring donations to one of the **Collection Sites**. We are also looking for churches who can get donations to Green Bay to volunteer to be Drop Off Sites for Ingathering. Gathered **supplies should be dropped off by June 2<sup>nd</sup> at a drop site** so they can get this to Green Bay for Annual Conference. Please contact the drop-off site in advance to arrange a time to deliver your supplies.

**Personal Dignity Kit (\$15 Value)** • 1 Bath Hand Towel -No kitchen towels • 1 Bath Washcloth - No dishcloths • 1 Adult Toothbrush - No multi-packs • 1 Bar Soap - 3 - 4



oz • 1 Shampoo - 12 - 19 oz • 1 Deodorant - 2-3 oz - stick, roll on, or pump • 1 Lotion – 8-10 oz • 1 1gal Resealable Plastic Bag

All items must be NEW & placed in a 1-gal resealable plastic bag - \$2 donation for toothpaste and carrying bag, per kit (Do not include in bag) Give donation to volunteers or mail to Wisconsin Annual Conference.

NOTE: MMDC requests a \$1 shipping fee for each kit and \$1.50 per bucket for the UMCOR Cleaning Kits.
